The title of this article was inspired by the daily devotional (Wisdom for Each Day) written by Reverend Billy Graham. Daily devotionals are a great way to focus our thinking. In the writing Reverend Graham says "Most of all, let the word of God fill you and renew your mind every day. When our minds are on Christ, Satan has little room to maneuver."

We all take numerous actions and make countless decisions each day. How we approach our day-to-day life situations requires us to rely on our thinking. It's been said that experience is the best teacher, and we will learn our entire life. Do you have a favorite teacher? One that inspired you, pushed you to overcome challenges or genuinely cared about your success? School teachers jump to mind when we think about learning, but we also learn from others. We learn through expertise or from shared experiences with others.

My Grandfather was a farmer, blacksmith, and machinist by trade. I remember the smell of coal burning to heat his workshop during the cold Eastern Montana winters. I love the smell of burning coal! Recognizing and embracing opportunities to enrich our lives and knowledge adds to our life experience and in turn helps build wisdom. The book of Proverbs emphasizes daily practical issues with a God-centered focus.

"Let the wise listen and add to their learning, and let the discerning get guidance." (Prov 1:5)

The collection of Wisdom in Proverbs is meant to help us avoid the high cost of learning the hard way. If you could choose your teacher, who would it be? The main author and compiler of Proverbs - Solomon himself - had the best teacher! When Solomon asked God for an understanding heart so he could be a good leader of God's people, the Lord was pleased and gave Solomon an enormous capacity and hunger for wisdom. We have the same teacher – the best teacher, God! Using wisdom for the benefit of others is a noble purpose.

God's great concern for us is with obedience, not with outcomes.


Remember that Jesus loves everyone you come in contact with.

We really do grow cold in our faith when we try to walk with God alone.




Speak Up
